Latest word is that 7000 acres of farmland have been impacted by these latest flood conditions here in

VT. The loss of veggies, fruits, and flowers after the drought and late starts and reseeding remains to be seen and we already know of the apple crop hit from the late frost in early summer. What a year! Life seems a bit topsy-turvy with the weather we are experiencing, making plans for summer events, traveling even just to visit someone within the state, or trying to keep up with lawns and gardens. It has been reported that our Earth has now had the hottest days on record. Naysayers will say weather patterns go in cycles. This appears to be true, but the extreme temperatures and two 100-years events in less than 50 years should give us pause. "Our little state of Vermont can't single handedly change the climate"; some say. "Everyone must do their part", say others.

As we learn more and become more concerned about the weather changes and extremes, we hear some who talk conspiracies, other believing what scientists say and others just rolling with the punches because they can only deal with so much and someone else has to take charge.

RECIPE for MAPLE BUTTER – First Place – Eunice Crowell

1 cup maple syrup ¾ cup (1 ½ sticks) of butter

Cook maple syrup in a small heavy-bottomed saucepan over low heat, without stirring until it reaches soft-ball stage (234° F on a candy thermometer). Stir in butter. Pour mixture into a deep bowl and beat with an electric mixer until thick and creamy which takes about 4 minutes. Makes 1 ³/₄ cups.

March 19, 1914 The Capital City Grange #469 was organized on March 19, 1914 under the direction of State Deputy Flint and State Master Cody, with 56 charter members. Caustic: Steward-James Holt; Assistant Steward-Luman Cutler; Lady Assistant Steward-Mrs. L. L. Cutler; Treasurer-M. W. Dewey; Secretary-Mrs. E. H. Lombardi; Gatekeeper-E. E. Foster; Ceres-Mrs. James Holt; Flora-Mrs. John Fiddock; Pomona-Mrs. W. d. Murray; Pianist-Mrs. Geo. Goss. It was agreed that the meetings should be held on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of each month. The W. R. C. Hall was used for our first meeting, and it was agreed to use this hall for the present. Mrs. James Holt acted as Secretary pro tem. The officers were duly installed by State Master Cody and the O.B. N. given to all members.
